eaders make people and places better. They move organizations from where they are to where they should be. Our world desperately craves good leadership.

Two thousand years later, Jesus's followers continue to lay down their lives for Him. He has inspired much of the world's greatest art and thought. Today, despite its apparent problems, no organization on earth matches the Church's breadth, scope, diversity, and influence. Surely, Jesus was onto something!
